Two Challenges in April 08! “Above & Beyond” and Evangelism

During our observance of Easter (all 50 days) our first Scripture Lesson (normally from the Old Testament) is from the Book of Acts. This “shift” during Eastertide enables us to see how the Resurrection of our Lord influenced those who believed in Jesus as the Christ. In Acts chapter 10 we read:

37 you yourselves know what happened throughout all Judea, beginning from Galilee after the baptism that John proclaimed: 38 how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power. He went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. 39 And we are witnesses of all that he did both in the country of the Jews and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree, 40 but God raised him on the third day and made him to appear, 41 not to all the people but to us who had been chosen by God as witnesses, who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. 42 And he commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one appointed by God to be judge of the living and the dead.

You can't miss the “Resurrection response!” As witnesses to what Jesus said and did, His followers went out and did what Jesus did. They carried on the work of their Lord by saying what He said and living as He lived.

Having celebrated the Resurrection of our Lord with great joy, we have the option of settling back into our ecclesiastical “easy chairs” and getting back to “business as usual.” The glory and reality of “Christ is risen” may easily fade into the background, and we may find ourselves mired in our daily routine. But it was not so for those first disciples of our Lord. There was NO going back to a “routine” or “business as usual.” They couldn't live the same way in light of the cross and empty tomb! Neither can we!

As confessional and confessing Lutherans, we believe that Christ gives what He gives and does what He does so that we might be FREE from sin to be “response-able” people of God. Our very Baptism into Christ's death and resurrection imparts a new identity and reality for our lives! We are free to be the people of God and to live lives that reflect our Lord's gracious giving.

Many of you know that for nearly 2 years, we have **not** been able to financially support any ministries outside of our own congregation and what we contribute to the Southeastern District (SED). We are not “giving” to any ministry or concern outside of ourselves!! Does THIS reality reflect our Lord's life and giving? We have 3 ministries that we have not been able to support as we did prior to occupying our new facility: 1) Crossway's Mission program, 2) Greenwood Lutheran Mission, and 3) United Ministries in Greenville.

On Sunday, April 20, we will have an opportunity to respond “***Above and Beyond***” ourselves and our regular contributions for the Lord's church. You will find a blue envelope (leftover from the *For Such a Time as This*” emphasis) in your bulletin that will give you an opportunity to support outside ministries “above and beyond” what you contribute. Any funds placed in the blue envelopes will be divided proportionately between the 3 ministries in our financial plan mentioned above. This opportunity to respond will occur on a monthly basis. What can you do? “*Freely you have received; freely give.*”

Another challenge: On Saturday, May 3rd, Immanuel Lutheran Church in Simpsonville will host an Evangelism workshop from 9 Am until 2 PM. If we are going to *preach to the people and to testify* as a congregation to the Resurrection of our Lord, we need to learn how to do so when outside the walls of our facility! We are challenged to “grow and go” in our verbalizing of the gospel to those estranged from the church. You are urged to join me at this workshop and to register by April 20.

So...2 challenges that will set before us an opportunity as a congregation. We can ignore them, or accept them. If Christ is risen from the dead, and we are alive in Him, then ignoring is not an option. Each of us can make a difference! Join me in doing so.

Where do I turn? There is an old saying: "You cannot wallow in a mud hole and not get any mud on you." Let me assure you that God has enough grace for you and your children to get through this time and place. Invite the Holy Spirit into your homes. God's stuff works! Make your home a place of truth, love, mercy, and righteousness. Above all pray. An honest petition for God's help in these matters with your family will go a long way in cementing the Christian core beliefs we attest to.

As for me; I am a 62 year old man who knows that the Holy spirit resides in me. God expects me to be salt and light. I also know that I do not want to go to heaven without my children. Therefore I have a desire to do God's will by keeping my focus towards God. I want to obey God and wish to abide in His love. I pray you do as well.

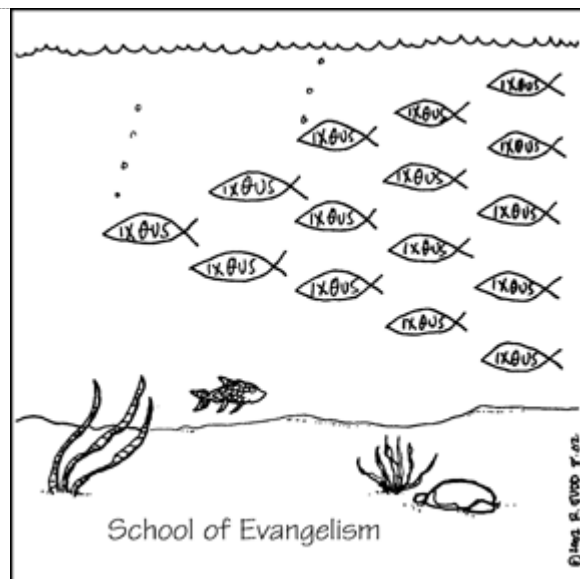

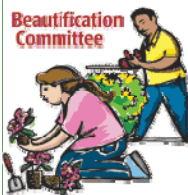


Memorial Book information needed

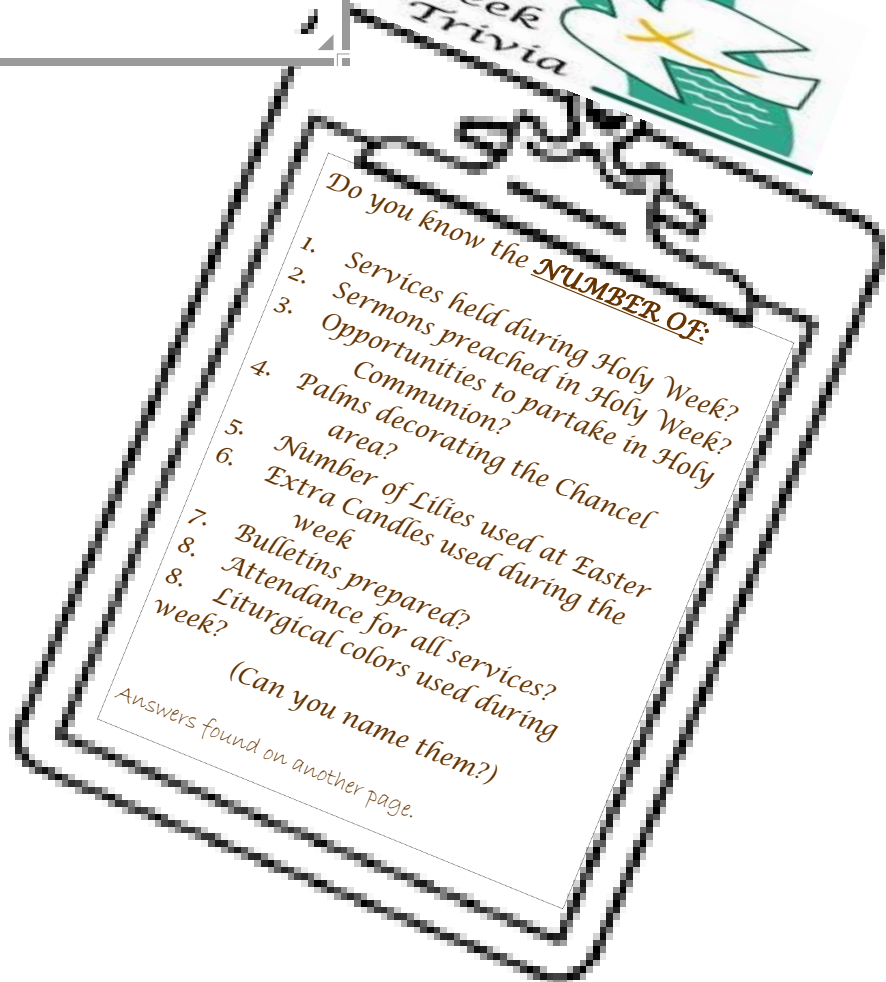

Altar Guild: Joan Winkelman reported that the Altar Guild had been raising funds to purchase new Paraments for Advent. They arrived this week (March 7) and are beautiful. They will be presented to the congregation the first Sunday in Advent. Also, new green banners have been received. Funds are still being collected to purchase another white set to replace the set lost in the fire. At this point there are White Paraments for Christmas and Easter and this set would be used for the other Sundays requiring white, such as Transfiguration, All Saints, Thanksgiving, etc.

Finding Hope in the Midst of Darkness

It was a lazy Sunday afternoon in 1991 when God first called Louise into service as a foster parent.

“I was just sitting on my couch watching television after church,” says Louise. “I saw an ad for foster care and I jumped right up and called the number.”

And the rest, as they say, is history. Over the next seven years, Louise was a foster parent to 10 different children. Then, in 1999, Louise approached LFS about fostering another child and was introduced to Marianne, a 9-year-old girl suffering from blindness, cerebral palsy and a mild case of mental retardation. Left in a hotel room with no adult supervision, Marianne had been badly neglected; she was severely underweight, unable to move, communicate or even chew solid food.

“She was in bad shape when she came to me,” says Louise. “She was sort of locked in the fetal position because her limbs were so stiff. I was conflicted about whether I could take care of her.”

After prayer and consideration, Louise decided to bring Marianne home with her. She poured herself into helping Marianne by working with her on communication, teaching her to chew solid food and bringing her to a doctor who fitted her with Baclofen pump, dramatically increasing her ability to utilize her muscles.

Now, thanks to the love and care that Louise had provided, 18-year-old Marianne can move freely, sit up, put her own socks on and feed herself with a modified spoon. She’s able to chew solid food and can tell who is speaking to her based on the sound of their voice. Currently Louise is helping Marianne learn to form coherent words.

“I’m reading to her every night to help her learn to speak,” says Louise. “Right now we’re reading ‘Peter Rabbit’s Giant Treasure.’”

“She’s just made so much progress. It’s hard to put it into words. She’s overcome a lot,” she continues. “God is in the picture here. It’s been a miracle and it’s wonderful to be part of it.”



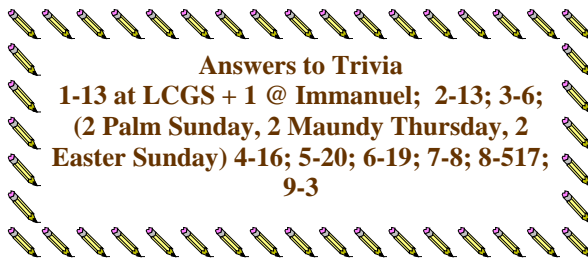
