American Sign Language (ASL) is a complex language using signs made with the hands and other movements, including facial expressions and body postures. It is the first language of many deaf in North America and is said to be the fourth most commonly used language in the United States. Different countries or regions use a different sign language. There is no universal form of sign language.

While ASL is used in America, it is a completely separate language from English. It contains all fundamental features a language needs to function—such as its own grammar, punctuation, and sentence order. It evolves and allows for regional usage and jargon's also changes regionally, just as certain English words are spoken differently in different parts of the country.

ASL should be introduced to a deaf child as early as possible. The first six months are the most crucial to a child's development of language skills and newborns should be screened for hearing loss during the first month. Language learning should be started during this state of development.

Good Shepherd provides an interpreter for the American Sign Language for the children's Sunday School and for the late Sunday morning service.

Prayer Piety

Piety is the practice of religious devotion. It is what all Christians DO to express their faith in action. Examples of piety include how we pray (kneeling, standing, using a prepared or "from the heart" prayer) as well as what we say. Traditional Lutheran prayer piety includes standing, kneeling, bowing the head and sometimes folding the hands while at prayer. There are also attitudes and beliefs about prayer that have been influenced by practices outside of the Lutheran Church.

Among most American Protestants (and few Roman Catholics I am certain) there is what I call a "popular Protestant piety" that influences how many Christians practice and think about prayer. How often have you heard someone talk about prayer as if it is a "sure fire" way to make God do something? The idea that prayer is a tool that will somehow coax or persuade God into taking action is fairly common. We hear this idea expressed in popular movements in the church that emphasize "how to pray" or stress a goal of numbers of people praying for a particular cause. The idea seems to be that if we just get enough people to pray hard enough, then God will wake up, pay attention to our need, and do what we think He wants done.

Now, let me be clear: prayer IS a very good thing! As Christians, we are expected to pray as a regular part of our disciplined life in communion with Christ and His church. Note that Jesus does NOT say, "*If you pray...*" but "*WHEN you pray...*" Our Lord expects that we will pray regularly as an expression of piety in our life in Christ. Luther makes the claim that: "...*you cannot find a Christian without prayer, just as you cannot find a living man without a pulse!*"

So pray we should! But let us beware lest we begin to think of our prayers as something needed to push or to MOVE God into action! In Matthew 6 (quoted above) Jesus tells us that we are not to "*heap up empty phrases as the Gentiles do, for they think that they will be heard for their many words.*" If you have ever found yourself thinking that you do not know how to pray because you cannot "pray like the pastor," consider Luther again: "*The fewer the words, the better the prayer; the more the words, the poorer the prayer.*"

As we pray, we should do so with the understanding that prayer is intended to work in and for US, not God! God acts in the world through His Church / US (He works through *means*). Prayer helps US realize 1) that loving action that God takes for US, and then 2) the action that we need to take. This is why we pray using both prayers and words from the Bible. The Scriptures guide us in how we should pray (such as: in Jesus' name; according to God's will). Prayer is a "good work" that we DO in faith-full response to God's self-giving and serving love in Christ.

So let us pray. Daily prayers can be found in the new hymnal ([Lutheran Service Book](#)) or in a variety of devotional helps available in our bookstore through CPH (see Anke Meyer).

Prayer is not appointed for the furnishing of God with the knowledge of what we need, but it is designed as a confession to Him of our sense of the need. In this, as in everything, God's thoughts are not as ours. God requires that His gifts should be sought for. He designs to be honored by our asking, just as He is to be thanked by us after He has bestowed His blessing.

Instead of taking 3 youth to the National Youth Gathering in Orlando this year the Youth group decided to save the money we had paid and take the upcoming youth (ages 11 & up) to LutherRock in Arden, NC, for an LCGS Youth Retreat for a weekend in late August. Greetings Fellow gardeners!

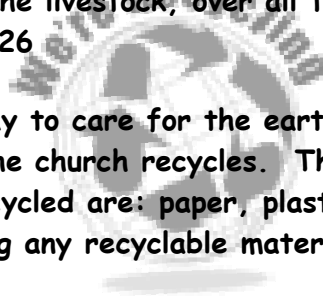

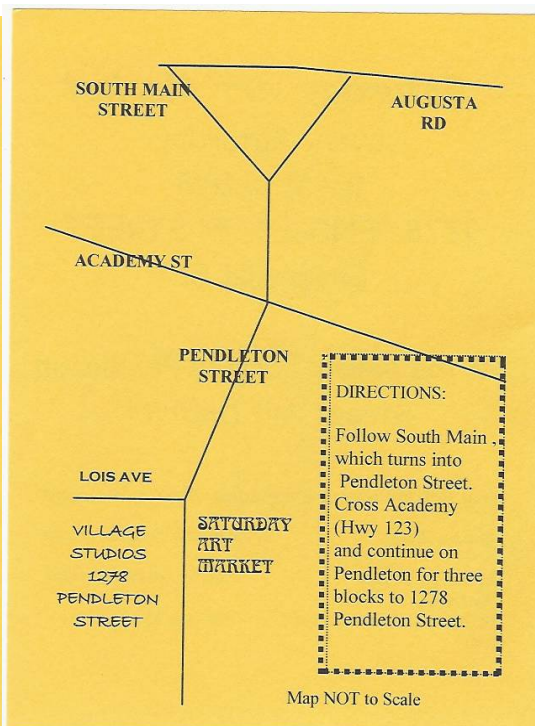

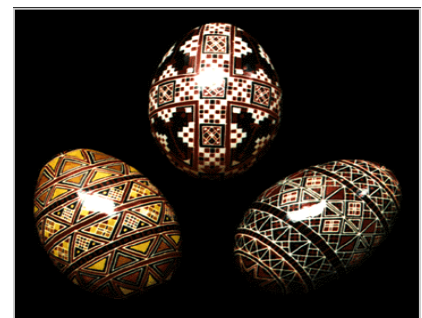

THE HOUSE OF GOD

From the time of the tabernacle up to present, there have been buildings used for worship. It is a holy place used for worship of God, for teaching and preaching the Word of God and for administering the Sacraments. The altar is the heart of the Lutheran Church, thus you will find it placed in the most prominent place in the worship area and the focus of worship. Church buildings usually have three main divisions of worship space; narthex, nave, and chancel. The sacristies are the preparatory liturgical spaces.

The three main areas of the worship space are:

The Narthex is the entrance room of the church. It is a place where members gather to greet one another and to prepare for worship. It should be an inviting and hospitable place that makes members and visitors feel welcome.

The Nave is the part of the building where the congregation is seated. The name is derived from the Latin *navis* which means ship, It should remind us of the church sailing in the ocean of time; and of our baptism with water.

The Chancel is the elevated place above the nave. It corresponds to the Holy Place of the tabernacle and temple. It is the place for the altar and pulpit and where most worship is conducted.

Today the common practice is to call the worship area, (nave and chancel areas), the Sanctuary, which is not correct terminology. The sanctuary pertains only to the area immediately surrounding the altar, which is usually raised above the rest of the chancel.

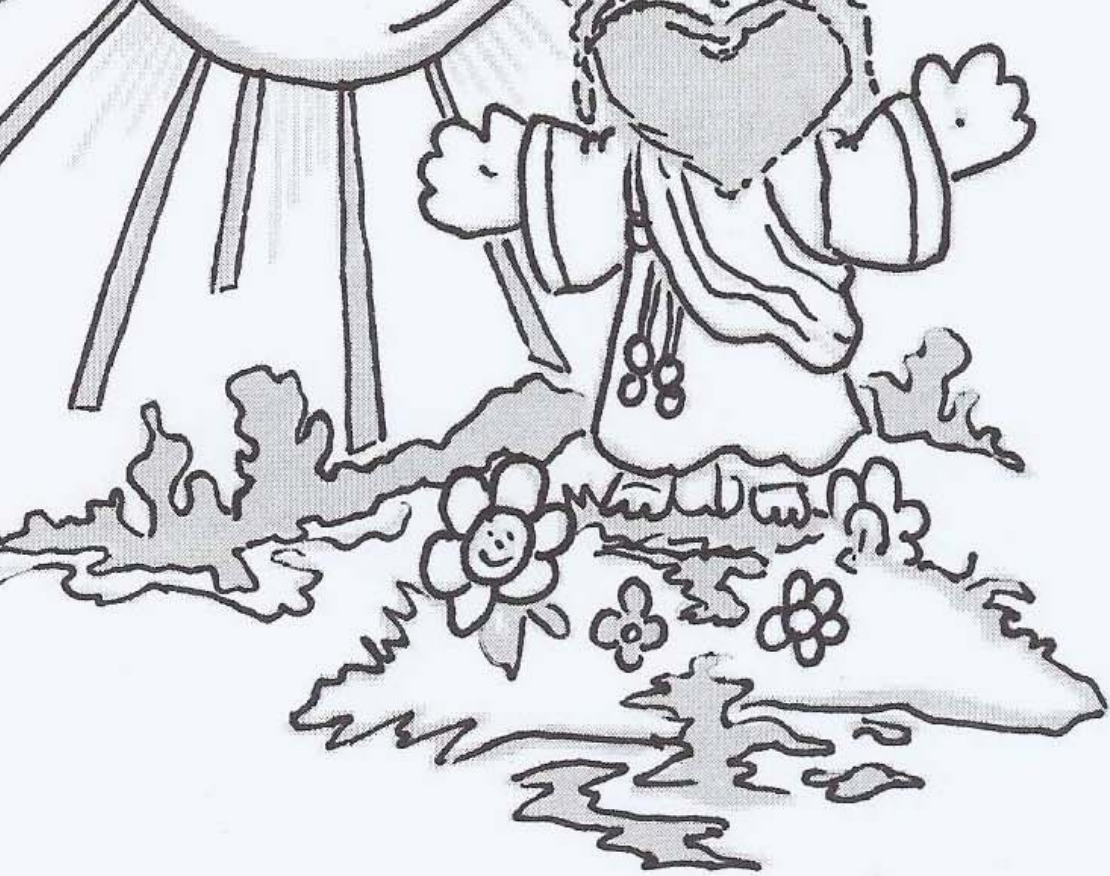
The Liturgical spaces include:

The Working Sacristy, which is the area where the altar guild prepares for the worship service. It is also the place to store the many items used in the various worship services.

The Vesting Sacristy is the area for liturgical preparation. The paraments, Pastor's robes and robes for the acolytes and choir are stored in this area. This is where the worship leaders vest and have prayers before the service.

At Good Shepherd, the Vesting Sacristy is also used as a small chapel where Wednesday morning Matins are read and small services held.
