






**Shrovetide-** a time for confession and absolution.

More commonly observed by the churches in England and Europe with carnivals or Mardi Gras, making merry before the 40 days of Lenten fasting begins. Shrove Tuesday was the day when Christians confessed their sins and received absolution. The custom of eating Pancakes on Shrove Tuesday began when Christians were forbidden to eat meat, butter, eggs, and milk during Lent. In order to use up these food items, pancakes were made. This tradition is common throughout Western Europe, Canada and Australia and recently become popular in the United States.

### February 2008 Quill Pastor's Note:

"Thus, when you give to the needy...when you pray...And when you fast..." Matthew 6:2, 5 & 16 Lent..."WHEN not IF"

As Ash Wednesday and Lent approaches, we will be reminded (especially in the readings for Ash Wednesday) of the "disciplines of Lent." Those neglected and little talked about practices of *almsgiving*, prayer and fasting that are traditionally mentioned and sometimes even practiced as a means of preparation for Easter. During the season of Lent, catholic Christians (those from historic liturgical traditions) emphasize such practices as an expression of self-denial.

In our Lutheran evangelical fervor, we avoid these disciplines, thinking that because we are justified by grace through faith, such practices are "works" and therefore we either neglect them altogether or view them with suspicion, if not a "Romaphobic" (catholic) fear. It is instructive that we notice that our Lord Jesus, in addressing such practices in His "Sermon on the Mount" in St. Matthew's gospel, doesn't speak of fasting, prayer and almsgiving as **options**, but as regular practices. To be sure, Jesus was addressing the traditional Jewish acts of piety that were the expected and normal religious practices of His day. Yet it is clear that while Jesus speaks against the performance of such pious actions for public display, He also expects that they will be observed. Thus His directive, "when you give to the needy...when you pray...when you fast." Christ does not say that the performances of such religious practices are bad in themselves; He does say that they should not be done for show.

I dare say that few of us (except for your pastor) make a habit of putting our personal devotional life or Lenten disciplines on display! Most Lutheran Christians do not strut their piety or religious expression around like a peacock; as did many of the observant Jews of Jesus' day. We Lutherans do not like to draw attention to ourselves. At the same time, let us understand that when undertaken with faith, such Lenten disciplines remind us that we do NOT give up foods (fast), pray or give to the poor to help or benefit ourselves in any manner! We fast, pray or give to remind ourselves of Christ's self-giving for us, and how we are to give of ourselves to others in a catechetical "serve and obey" response to Jesus' love. Let us be reminded of what Dr. Harry Wendt calls the "BECAUSE-THEREFORE" understanding of any good work: it is BECAUSE God in Christ gives so completely, freely and generously of Himself in His life and passion for our salvation that we THEREFORE give of ourselves by serving the neighbor in need. Our works of love or "disciplines" are NOT done in order to earn or merit God's salvation; they are done (WHEN not IF) because God has given us salvation in Christ!

Supportive "hints" of such disciplines are to be found in the catechism. In the "Conclusion" of the Lord's Prayer, he says: "...He Himself has commanded us to pray in this way and has promised to hear us." In his answer to the question: "who receives this Sacrament worthily? He writes: "fasting and bodily preparation are certainly fine outward training." As for giving to the poor as a regular expression of our faith: we have only to read what the Scriptures say about money in order to understand that!

As we think about how to prepare ourselves this Lent, we would do well to consider observing such tried and true "fine outward training" as an expression of our faith in the One who gives of Himself unto death (so that we might live). Let us bear in mind that we do not fast or "give-up" anything for ourselves in a negative manner; we do so to benefit others positively, while at the same time reminding ourselves that it is our "new-creation" nature in Christ that moves us to give or to give-up. Like the 10 Commandments in the Small Catechism, there is both a positive (do this) and a negative (don't do this) dimension to the expression of faith in Christ.

May God grant us a Holy Lent!

"Evangelize" YIKES! That's what preachers are supposed to do, right? After all I've got a mortgage and bills to pay, kids to raise, I pray when a need arises, I go to church, I even give money to the church. I'm doing my part-right? That my friends, is the basic idea of this Americanized Christianity we are living today.

Sometime ago I heard someone say "The art of life is getting the message". So I ask; What's the message? Better yet where does the message come from? We get an hour and a half on Sunday mornings. Then we get 160 plus hours elsewhere the rest of the week. Either place the message is joy. Real joy can only be realized when it is contrasted with your trials. Your ability to make this judgment is either Biblically based or it comes from Madison Avenue. Our country has dramatically changed over the last 50 years, and it looks like Madison Avenue is more attractive to our nation. Consequently—the cause of Christ has greatly diminished.

Recently Karen, my wife, came to me with an idea...That maybe we should sell all that we have and go live and work in a mission field: South America or someplace. After much consideration-maybe 5 1/2 seconds, I said that we already live in a mission field. Besides that, God has already placed us here. We have a responsibility to recognize the need around us. Now God has not placed a score pad in our hands to tally all those whom we have brought to Christ...Nor has he given us a poster sign to carry around proclaiming that "The end is near". What God has given us is a daily opportunity to talk with or listen to someone in need. Make no mistakes about this. God uses average people just like you and I. That evidence is recorded throughout the Bible and in church history. I am sure even people with biblical confidence like Martin Luther found himself praying at the end of the day, asking God for reassurance that what he is doing is the right thing.

Be sure that God has placed you where you are in order for you to bring the reassurance of His word to others. This starts with prayer-and a building up of each other-husbands to wives, wives to husbands, parents to children, neighbor to neighbor. This will take more than an hour and a half on Sunday mornings, you will need to spend more time in the Bible. By doing this your purpose in life will start to take shape.

We tend to see ourselves as a member of a church; A collective gathering of believers...yes as a group we can do good and sometimes great things, but the un-churched will see you as an individual. They will judge you by your motives, by your kindness, by your forgiveness, by your (fill in the blank). What I am trying to say is that <a href="By Yourself">By Yourself</a> you are the church. Having faith in God should be easy – after all God does everything right. Having faith in yourself to do the right thing...now that takes faith! Allow me to remind you that the Holy Spirit is alive and well within you. This is as God has promised. He will never leave you or forsake you. So go with confidence believing in Saint Paul's prayer, that what is already true in you-will be true of you.

In closing I would like to share with you a personal thought——Someday my life will end. I will stand before God for the accounting: I can hear God say—"I've got good news and I've got bad news - the bad news is you didn't do everything quite right and in some cases you really missed the mark. The good news is that I talked with my Son and He says that you made an honest attempt to understand My Word and bring it to others, therefore, welcome—enter My Kingdom My good and faithful servant."

### **United Ministries' Greenville Worships Together**

United Ministries' Greenville Worships Together will bring the community together on Sunday, March 2 at Springfield Baptist Church at 5:00 pm. This annual service has inspired people since 1998. People of all denominations, ages, and interests come together to worship, sing, and pray together. This year's keynote preacher is Pastor Robert Miles of St. Michael Lutheran Church. The Springfield Baptist Choir will be one of the groups leading us in music. The Rev. John Corbitt of Springfield will welcome everyone and invite all to a reception after the service. On January 20, Beth Templeton of United Ministries presented a talk about her new program called "Our Eyes Were Opened" in which she explained opportunities offered by "Our Eyes Were Opened", The mission is to sensitize people with resources to issues of poverty so they can reach out to people without resources in wise and compassionate ways. She works with individuals and groups who want to help but don't know how. Our Eyes Were Opened helps clarify issues of poverty so we can reach out with wisdom and compassion. Some opportunities available through this program are: Poverty Simulation, learning how a family deals with poverty for a month, It's Our Community, Too, touring neighborhoods showing the limited choices some experience; Helping Others: Servant or Sucker gives tips for reaching out to others without feeling you've been "suckered"; Understanding Poverty in the Classroom helps educators understand how socioeconomic differences impact students and their opportunities for success in the classroom; Faith and Service Go Together Like Peanut Butter and Jelly looks ag scripture and considers that service to God, our fellow human beings, and ourselves is where we begin to get the answers and insight on how to link faith and service in wise and compassionate ways; Teens Learning to Care is designed to build empathy in adolescents for their classmates who may live in poverty situations. Our Eves Were Opened staff are available for programs on any services offered at United Ministries.

### UNITED MINISTRIES What you can do to help

Take up collections of...

- 1. **MONEY**-Ask for or donate stock or cash; "Pass the basket" at work, neighborhood, civic club, etc.; Host a fundraiser; Contact people who will make a gift. Other?
- 2. Collect items needed by individuals or social service agencies: Books, School Supplies, Clothing, Food items, Toiletry items, Household goods, Gift Cards, Work Gear, other?
- 3. **Write Letters to** advocate for your issue or concern, to appropriate decision makers, to the editor, others? Give of your time...
- 1. **Volunteer** for regular times each week/month; Commit to a specific time bound project; Serve on a committee, task force, Board of Directors; other?
- 2. **Ignite others** to your issue/concern in your workplace; your neighborhood, your civic groups, your social groups, vour congregation, other?
- 3. **Meet and talk with people who are suffering**: Volunteer with an organization which works with people for whom you have a passion, Look in your neighborhood, workplace, place of worship and begin a conversation with someone you see; read stories, books, and articles about people suffering; other?
- 4. **Learn about your issue of passion:** Talk with people who are already working to the area of your interest,; Listen carefully and deeply before making suggestions; Read and research your issue; Create forums where ideas can be shared and discussed; other?
- 5. **Become aware of how your life impacts others;:** By fairly traded products; Offer someone a job and work with him/her in learning how to keep it; Use resources in ways that benefit the greater good; reduce your energy consumption; other?
- 6. **Provide Prayer, Spiritual**, emotional, and social support;

### **The Face of Homelessness** (This ties in with the United Ministries Page) *Mecia Moss LFS Carolinas*

How often have you passed a "bum" on the street and averted your eyes in shame? How many times have you noticed a homeless individual sitting on a park bench and almost immediately dismissed them as a hopeless case?

Rarely do you see a homeless person as being very much like you. The most common stereotypes of the homeless include "drunk," "drug addict," and "lazy." In reality, 45 percent of homeless people work - sometimes as many as three jobs at a time- but at minimum wage, they just don't make enough to be able to afford housing. And, of the 3.5 million people who have been homeless this year, nearly a third are children. Many families live paycheck-to-paycheck and one major, unexpected expense can create a spiral into financial crisis of which the end result is homelessness. The truth is that the face of homelessness looks just like your friend, your neighbor, your child or you. It can happen to anyone.

The two biggest factors contributing to homelessness, according to the National Coalition for the Homeless, are a growing shortage of affordable rental housing and an increase in poverty. Other factors that increase the risk for homelessness, especially among the working poor, are mental or physical illness, physical or sexual abuse, a lack of resources and support for young people, and depression. But the important point to recognize here is that these are conditions that affect but do not define the lives of the homeless.

Jesus recognized that the outcasts in society are often seen, not as individuals, but as the condition in which they live. We categorize the homeless but how many of us know the name of even one homeless person- or their story? Jesus did. In Luke 4:18 he declared, "The Spirit of the Lord is on me, because he has anointed me to preach good news to the poor." He came specifically to reach out to those who are most often overlooked. Shouldn't we do the same?

If you are interested in getting to know the story of someone who is homeless, consider volunteering at a local soup kitchen or even just offering a cup of coffee and conversation to someone on the street. ### **Observing Lent**

Have you ever noticed that when you're really down, sometimes all you want is for someone to sit beside you? You're not looking to them for answers or a fix for what you're dealing with but somehow it helps just to know that they're sitting through the sadness with you.

Ash Wednesday, the day that begins the season of Lent, allows people of the faith community to essentially sit in sadness together. It is a day that liturgically allows you to mourn for your mortality and reflect on the fact that being human means that eventually every person will experience death. Your pastor will probably take this day to remind you that, "you are dust, and to dust you shall return." The passion story of our Lord during Holy Week reminds us that he, too, experienced fully what it means to be human, even to the point of dying.

The good news is that once we have made it through the sadness of Ash Wednesday, we get to begin a journey upward from that lowest point in the church year. It is a journey toward the healing and wholeness that is promised to all of us in the good news of Jesus' resurrection on Easter. It is a journey into the eternal life that transcends the ashes and lament of death.

Many people give up something as a part of their observation of Lent. This year, consider giving up something that is precious to everyone- time! You could take the time you would spend on yourself-watching your favorite TV shows or golfing with friends- and instead give it away to someone else during Lent. You could write personal letters of encouragement to everybody on your Christmas list that you could only hurriedly dash off a card to in December. You might spend some time visiting someone who is homebound or in a nursing home. Or you could take part in some new volunteer opportunities. Time seems to be the most precious thing we have to give in our society. So to sacrifice some of yours would be a very meaningful way to observe Lent, especially if it allows you to encourage someone else on their journey.
