



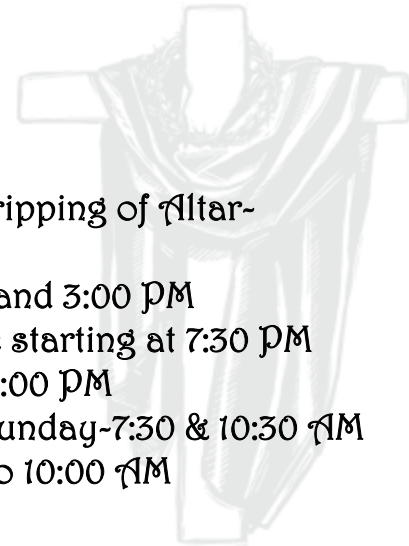

First day of Holy Week. A day of triumph and tragedy when we observe both Christ's triumphant entry into Jerusalem as well as his death on the cross. The service begins with the blessing of the palms. We meet at 8:30 and 10:30 AM.

Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday of Holy Week we will hold Vesper Services starting at 7:00 PM.. Join us for an evening, or all three as we continue our journey with Christ to his death and resurrection.



Maundy is from a Latin word Mandatum meaning command. Jesus said at the Last Supper "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another." (John 13:34). We observe the day with foot washing ceremony and Holy Communion. Services at 12:00 noon and 7:00 PM.

The most solemn day of the church year. The day of Christ's sacrifice on the cross. The Way of the Cross at 12:00 noon and 3:00 PM . Tenebrae Vespers will begin at 8:00 PM. The evening will start at 7:30 with music played by Jim Derrick.



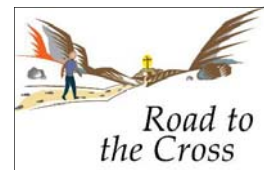
The Great Vigil of Easter is the climax of our spiritual preparations during Lent and Holy Week. The liturgy has four parts: Service of Light, Service of Readings, Holy Baptism, and Holy Communion. We will meet at Immanuel Lutheran Church in Simpsonville for the Great Vigil beginning at 8:00 PM

Day of Resurrection. Day of the Empty Tomb. The main service of the entire Church Year. Holy Communion is always celebrated on Easter Sunday. We begin at 7:30 AM with Sunrise Service using Setting 4 of the LSB. Breakfast will be served from 8:30 to 10:00 AM and the Festival Holy Communion service at 10:30 AM using setting 1 of the LSB.



Breakfast will be served Easter morning from 8:30 to 10:00 AM. Plan on staying after early service or come early for the late service for a good breakfast and fellowship.

To fully realize the impact of the Resurrection of our Lord on that great Easter Day, you need to walk with Him from his triumphal entry into Jerusalem to his death on the cross. See you at church during Holy Week.

March 2008 Quill Pastor's Note:

" We preach Christ crucified ..." I Corinthians 1:23a"

Are you enjoying the new hymnal (*The Lutheran Service Book*) so far? There are two hymns in the new hymnal that might prove difficult for one to sing during Lent and Holy Week. Hymn # 437, *Alas! And Did My Savior Bleed*, and # 448, *O Darkest Woe*. In both are verses that get at the heart of what is called the *Paschal mystery*. In the first hymn is a verse that claims:

*Well might the sun in darkness hide, And shut his glories in, When God, the mighty maker, **died** for His own creatures' sin.*

In the second hymn mentioned above, we sing this second verse:

*O sorrow dread! Our God is **dead**, upon the cross extended...*

There are some outside of the church that would like to think that God is dead. It is one thing to say that God IS dead, and entirely another thing to say –as Christians do- that God, in Christ, has died.

There has recently been some concern expressed among certain Christian groups and organizations over the release of the children's fantasy movie, *The Gold Compass*. The book series upon which the movie is based (by author Philip Pullman) includes characters that attempt to "kill God." The reaction of many Christians has been both swift and censorious. Petitions have been circulated and the movie condemned.

Are we surprised at this? My first thought about the furor was: *"This is nothing new! People tried to kill God before, and He rose from the dead on the third day!"* I wonder if confessing Christians might not turn the preposterous claims of Pullman's books (and the anxiety over the movie) into an opportunity to proclaim "*Christ crucified?*" What would happen if we simply admitted that God does indeed die...in Christ, upon the cross, and rises again on the third day? After all, the Gospel we read, hear and ponder at Easter proclaims that *"you can't keep THE Good Man down!"*

The world simply cannot comprehend the mystery of our salvation in the crucified God, Jesus Christ. St. Paul reminds us that the cross is *"folly to those who are perishing."* (I Corinthians 1:18) Two of the major world's religious systems cannot accept the teaching of the incarnation (God in human flesh); and the notion that God would take on our humanity even to the point of *"death on a cross"* (Philippians 2:8) is simply more outrageous! The idea of God's death imparting life to mankind offends the rational mind so much so that it is scorned. Let's admit that what we believe and observe over the approaching Holy Week simply doesn't make sense to many in this modern (and post-modern) world. The death and resurrection of Christ "does NOT compute." But the reality of the cross means forgiveness of sin and life with God for those who believe, and the Sacraments (Holy Baptism, Holy Eucharist and Holy Absolution) that Christians observe all bring us "*Christ crucified*" in a very physical and personal manner.

The death of our Savior, Jesus Christ upon the cross defies explanation; it is truly a mystery. As we draw near to the conclusion of Lent and prepare to observe Holy Week and the *"Three Days"* of the mystery of our salvation, our attention is focused upon *Christ crucified*. This is God's self-giving love in action, and as Martin Luther reminds us in the catechism, it is *"most certainly true!"*

We believe that *Christ, our Passover lamb, has been sacrificed. Therefore let us keep the Festival!* Join God's people around the world over Holy Week and the *Triduum* as we observe *Christ crucified*.

Finding Hope in the Midst of Darkness

It was a lazy Sunday afternoon in 1991 when God first called Louise into service as a foster parent.

“I was just sitting on my couch watching television after church,” says Louise. “I saw an ad for foster care and I jumped right up and called the number.”

And the rest, as they say, is history. Over the next seven years, Louise was a foster parent to 10 different children. Then, in 1999, Louise approached LFS about fostering another child and was introduced to Marianne, a 9-year-old girl suffering from blindness, cerebral palsy and a mild case of mental retardation. Left in a hotel room with no adult supervision, Marianne had been badly neglected; she was severely underweight, unable to move, communicate or even chew solid food.

“She was in bad shape when she came to me,” says Louise. “She was sort of locked in the fetal position because her limbs were so stiff. I was conflicted about whether I could take care of her.”

After prayer and consideration, Louise decided to bring Marianne home with her. She poured herself into helping Marianne by working with her on communication, teaching her to chew solid food and bringing her to a doctor who fitted her with Baclofen pump, dramatically increasing her ability to utilize her muscles.

Now, thanks to the love and care that Louise had provided, 18-year-old Marianne can move freely, sit up, put her own socks on and feed herself with a modified spoon. She’s able to chew solid food and can tell who is speaking to her based on the sound of their voice. Currently Louise is helping Marianne learn to form coherent words.

“I’m reading to her every night to help her learn to speak,” says Louise. “Right now we’re reading ‘Peter Rabbit’s Giant Treasure.’”

“She’s just made so much progress. It’s hard to put it into words. She’s overcome a lot,” she continues. “God is in the picture here. It’s been a miracle and it’s wonderful to be part of it.”
