

November 2007 Quill Pastor's Note:

"Spiritually Growing"

As a congregation, we claim to be a *spiritually growing* community. That is the first claim of our congregation's "vision statement" which describes WHO we are and WHAT we value. While we all know what *growth* is, *spiritual growth* may be harder for us to define. That is not surprising, because anything described as "spiritual" may raise a few eyebrows in the modern world in which we live. We live in a world that is schizophrenic: some outright deny the existence of a spiritual realm or beings belonging to that realm. Others understand "spiritual" in a very vague or general sense, and would apply it to *any* religious system. Such people readily acknowledge spirituality to be about God, but that is far as it goes. Mention "God the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ" or the word Trinity or even Jesus' name as exclusive to Christian spirituality and you could find yourself in trouble.

Let's be clear: spirituality pertains to the unseen realm and to our participation in that realm. We are NOT talking about visible or measurable things like the number of people attending church, buildings, or the amount of money in the collection plate. No, we are talking about growth in thing unseen; things like the "faith hope and love" that the Apostle Paul mentions in I Corinthians 13:13.

As Baptized, faithful Christians, we must be the first to admit that not just any spirituality will do. While we agree with many religions and share commonalties with nearly all of them, as Christians, our "spirituality" is founded upon the incarnate God revealed in Jesus Christ. In other words, spirituality begins NOT with what we do or us but with who God is! We know no other God than the God revealed in Jesus Christ. It is as Paul says in Colossians 1:

15 He (Christ Jesus) is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation. 16 For by him all things were created, in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible...

We do well to well not Jesus' own words in John's gospel (14:9):

Whoever has seen me has seen the Father.

For Christians, the word "spiritual" always begins with the God who becomes flesh in the only Son: Jesus, the Christ! So to grow "spiritually" means growing in Christ who claimed us at our Baptism. It means that as our physical bodies grow and maintain themselves through proper nutrition, so also our inward person (soul or spirit) grows in faith, knowledge and the love and fear of God IN Christ.

At Good Shepherd, we understand such growth to occur as the result of linking up with Christ in His appointed <u>means</u>: Word and Sacraments. These are the <u>means of grace</u> through which God works in our lives, for to such means God has attached His promise. It's not that God cannot work in other ways, it's simply that He has attached His promised to the means of Word and Sacraments. They are Christ's gifts for the life of His Church!

So, think it over: how often do you take advantage of God's means for your growth? If any Christian relies only upon 1 hour and 15 minutes once a week (at Sunday service) for the nurture of her faith, then growth may be challenged. If any Christian spends more time watching TV than time spent in prayer with or service to Christ (by serving the neighbor) then I wonder if growth will occur? Martin Luther's Small Catechism makes clear that DAILY involvement in and recognition of God's action through Word and Sacrament are essential for maintenance growth in the Christian life. Such things are not just pious works, nor are they "optional:" they are the power of God given to us in the gospel.

So think it over. How are YOU growing? Are we spiritually growing as a congregation? What would happen if you asked God to help you grow in His grace, offered in Word and Sacrament? Might you take advantage of weekly Bible study, prayer and daily devotional reading / study that are the means that bring Christ to you?

As Advent approaches and we prepare for the revealing of Christ in His Nativity, let's think and pray about taking advantage of and growing in the grace revealed in our Lord Jesus Christ.



Tuesday, December 25- Christmas Day- the time was moved up to 10:30 AM on Christmas morning.



ALTAR GUILD

The Altar Guild has been collecting funds to purchase a set of paraments to be used during the Advent season. The design and fabric has been selected. We will need to find an additional \$1500.00 before the order can be placed.

Paraments are used on the altar, lectern, and pulpit as a visual focus of the worship space. The color of the paraments depends on the particular day or season of the church year. Paraments have been used in the church since the fifth century AD. The life of a set of paraments that is used often runs about 20 years and most of our paraments exceed that time.

A set of paraments consists of the superfrontal or altar covering, coverings for the pulpit and lectern, the pre-communion veil (used to cover the chalice before the Eucharist is prepared) and Pastor's stole.

Any donations will be accepted, make sure it is marked "for paraments" or we are open to ideas on how to come up with the additional money.

Honoring Veterans

Coming home from war can be a difficult experience for veterans. Soldiers who experience combat are often changed in ways that most civilians cannot comprehend. In a recent study conducted by the University of California, San Francisco and the San Francisco VA Medical Center, it was found that 31 percent of soldiers returning from Iraq between 2001 and 2005 were diagnosed with mental health and/or psychosocial challenges. The most common diagnoses include post traumatic stress disorder, anxiety disorder, adjustment disorder, depression and substance abuse disorder.

Many soldiers return with war injuries- from lost limbs to blindness to brain damage and countless other disabilities- that can make even simple, everyday tasks incredibly difficult. Often such injuries make finding and maintaining employment nearly impossible.

Even soldiers who return without health issues frequently find it difficult to return to their "normal" pre-war life. They may meet with incomprehension and even fear and anger from their friends, families or other civilians. And yet, these are the men and women who have willingly put their lives on the line for their country. While civilians may not be able to fully understand what veterans have endured and sacrificed for their country, you can show them the respect they deserve and accept them with the loving, open arms of Christ.

On November 11, millions of people across the U.S. will celebrate Veteran's Day. There are many ways you can take part in honoring our veterans, this day and any other:

- Write a veteran a thank-you note, or send a letter to an entire Veteran's of Foreign War or American Legion post• Write a letter to a soldier currently serving in the Middle East
- Talk to your children about who veterans are, what they do and what their service means to our country




